REPORT FROM THE MANAGING COMMITTEE

Committee Assumes New Role As Board Of Directors

A great deal has been accomplished since the last newsletter, with both the administration and Friends itself.

First, as to the teams, you know that the administration agreed to petition to keep the women's teams at the Sprints levels by seeking reclassification to NCAA Division One. That will occur this spring and be self-effectuating for next year. We have agreed to the use of money from the Friends account to pay the substantial NCAA fee for that petition and to assist in other ways.

More recently, the administration also agreed to use money from the Friends account to increase the frosh coaches' salaries for this year and in coming years on an interim basis. In connection with that decision, the administration has stated that its long-term goal is to pay all coaches competitive salaries. This is a fundamental and critical change from a couple of years ago, when it appeared impossible to pay a rowing coach at MIT anywhere near what his or her colleagues at other Sprints schools were paid. This dramatic development has been possible only through the hard work and leadership of Athletic Director Candace Royer and Dean Larry Benedict. It now enables us to move forward with preparations for a major development campaign. More on that later.

In the meantime, with the significant increases in financial support for the teams by Friends, it is as important as ever to replenish the Friends' account with your contributions to "MIT-Friends of Crew." See the column in this issue by Mike Scott and look for a separate appeal letter in the near future. In addition to supporting the items noted in this issue, these funds will also help cover the cost of doubling the number of women's crew coaches, we hope as soon as fall 2002.

There have also been important developments within Friends. The alumni office has helped us update the listserv sub-

stantially, nearly doubling its size, and many of you should be receiving this newsletter in PDF format by e-mail weeks before a hard copy arrives in the U.S. mail. (We apologize for the lateness of this issue, which we had hoped to have in your hands by early February.) We also hope to continue to improve our ability to communicate by establishing a Friends Web site.

We have taken steps to expand the Friends' organization as recommended in the October 1999 Strategic Plan. The Managing Committee adopted a set of by-laws (see pages 9-11) on March 16, 2002, after extensive review and discussion with a number of heavily involved alumni. The Managing Committee of five was joined by four others to form the initial phase of the interim Board of Directors, which will serve until next October. These four are Cindy Cole, Malcolm Gefter, Linda Muri, and Karl Richter. Further, based on a productive meeting led by Bill Hecht and supported by his office, four more directors have joined us to round out the interim board. They are Jack Frailey, Mike Greated, Bill McTigue, and Willie Vicens. If you have any comments or questions on the bylaws or are interested in serving in some capacity, please contact us. We are looking for volunteers to help and will prepare nominations for the board for an election in the fall.

While you are considering how you can help, please try to attend the spring races and support our teams. We have a committee led by Katy Croff and Stephanie Chen '01, who are attempting to coordinate our support. See their column in this issue, contact them to offer your help, and look for the MIT tent at the races!

We would like to thank the Fund Campaign Planning Committee, which has worked on communications and planning for a fund-raising campaign for the last

two years. Its efforts are much appreciated, and now that its work is completed, we are pleased that some of its members are willing to continue to work on the board to increase financial support for MIT crew.

Look for information in the coming months on the development campaign headed by Pete Peterson. Friends plans to continue an increased level of support for the teams in the immediate future while working to raise millions of dollars to establish endowments sufficient to guarantee adequate support for intercollegiate crew thereafter.

Our next steps include development of the Web site; coordinating staff support in the alumni office for our increased activities; growing the regatta committee (contact Katy and Steph now to help); negotiating "gift memoranda" with the administration to define the terms of the use of endowed funds to be raised to support intercollegiate crew; working on details of Friends' support for implementing the staffing and expenses for a women's lightweight team; and planning and initiating a major development campaign.

FRIENDS OF MIT CREW FINANCIAL UPDATE

Summary Of Costs, Funds, And Future Plans For Crew And FOMITC

This is a written summary of what was presented at the annual Friends of MIT Crew dinner held the weekend of the Head of the Charles in Cambridge. If you have any questions or comments, send them via e-mail to mscott@cisco.com or to mitcrew@external.cisco.com.

Current MIT Crew Costs: The total MIT crew budget for FY02 (which ends June 30, 2002) is approximately \$723k. The largest percentage of the budget is the salaries and benefits of the coaching and service staff. The next largest expenditure is for competition and training trip costs. The third largest expenditure is the purchase of new shells outfitted with oars and sound equipment. There are also other expenditures for coach launches, trucks and trailers to transport shells, ergometers, weight/exercise equipment, and boathouse operations/maintenance/supplies. Note that these costs do not include depreciation of the boathouse itself.

Use of FOMITC Funds: When you make out a check to MIT and designate Friends of MIT Crew, the funds go into the

FOMITC Fund. At the beginning of FY02 (July 1, 2001), the FOMITC Fund had approximately \$877k. This is NOT an endowment fund, and its principal is retained in an interest-bearing account, with MIT able to spend funds agreed upon by the FOMITC Board of Directors, as specified by the agreement recently published in this newsletter. The amount of spending out of the FOMITC Fund has varied quite a bit, but has been relatively small in recent years: FY98—\$112k, FY99—\$31k, FY00—\$23k, FY01—\$39k.

You can see there was significant slowdown in spending for several years while the FOMITC Managing Committee worked out some key issues with MIT. During FY02, we have agreed to the expenditure of in excess of \$174k for items such as exercise bicycles, back machines, weight equipment, coach launches, a truck to pull the shell trailer, a racking system for boathouse shells, the IRA training trip, FOMITC administrative costs, and other areas still being discussed with MIT. The FOMITC Board of Directors is working with MIT now to solidify plans

for FY03, and we believe we will be spending comparable amounts or more that year. Thus, we need to replenish the Friends' account.

Endowments 101: FOMITC intends to lead an effort to fully endow the costs associated with MIT crew. Endowments are donated funds professionally invested by MIT to grow in principal, but provide about 4 percent/year to be used for specified expenditures. Historically, MIT's endowments have grown, on average, far in excess of 4 percent/year, which allows the endowment principal to grow to accommodate inflation and annual expenditure increases. An example is that MIT encourages the endowment of a professorship with an initial investment of \$3 million. While FOMITC needs to agree on the specific dollar amounts, some examples of MIT crew endowments that we are planning are as follows: varsity coaches (\$2.1-2.4 million endowment each), freshmen/JV coaches (\$1.2 million endowment each), fully outfitted eight-person shell that is replaced every four years

We Introduce Some Of The New Members Of The Interim Board

We welcome the new members of the interim board, some of whom we've highlighted below. We'll report on the others in the next issue.

CINDY COLE

Cindy's involvement with rowing has been varied but uninterrupted since she began rowing in 1974 at MIT. She rowed with MIT's women's crew from 1974 to 1979. She competed in the Potomac Boat Club's open women's sweep program for six years. She coached the open women's sweep program for five years and then the master's women's sweep program for another six. She has been competing as a sculler since the early '80s. She has been on the board of governors of the Potomac Boat Club since 1992 and has been president of the club since 1995.

MALCOLM GEFTER

Malcolm is a professor emeritus at MIT after serving as a professor for 25 years in the department of biology. He spent sever-

al seasons helping the freshman rowing program at MIT by teaching sculling and early rowing to first-timers. An active rower and student of rowing, he participates regularly in national and international regattas. He also studied rowing and coaching as a student and has worked with Charles Butt Jr. and Gordon Hamilton. He has been active at the Cambridge Boat Club as a member of the rowing committee for many years, has served on the board of directors, and is currently president of the club.

LINDA MURI

Linda began her rowing career at MIT as a participant in the Class Day Intramural Regatta. From there, she joined the novice squad and rowed for four years as an undergraduate. She served as captain of the varsity for two years and as vice commodore of the boat house for one year. She has continued rowing since graduating from MIT and competed on the U.S. national team for nine years. Her master's

career has just taken off as she entered that level of competition last fall. After coaching the freshman lightweight men for three years at Cornell, she is now in her first year at Harvard, coaching the freshman lightweight men's crew. She was recently elected to represent the northeast region on the U.S. Rowing Board of Directors.

KARL RICHTER

Karl Richter was MIT heavyweight captain in '98 and '99, MVP of the heavyweight squad in '99, and commodore of the Boat Club in '99. He rowed four years at MIT and was stroke of the varsity 4+ that won the silver medal at the IRA Regatta in '99. He won several medals in sculling events at the U.S. club national championships and at the Canadian Henley as part of the Union Boat Club pre-elite camp in the summer of '98. Karl has also twice won medals in the Head of the Charles. Currently, he rows on the Schuylkill River, where he is a member of Undine BC.

MEN'S HEAVYWEIGHT CREW WRAP-UP

Squads Show Much Promise For Bright Future

This has been an interesting term for the varsity heavyweights, working with a very young squad and learning how to race. The term began with our capturing the gold medal in the open four at the Head of the Ohio, a target we have had in our sights since 1989. We have come in as high as silver before, but never won the trophy. It was tremendously gratifying.

The following weekend we traveled to Hookset, New Hampshire, for the New Hampshire Championships. It appeared that our main competition would be coming from a strong Dartmouth crew, a boat of which the worst 2,000m erg score was considerably better than our best. It turned out that Dartmouth was not the only boat we needed to worry about and that, no matter what past results we hung around our necks, we still needed to be at our best to win. This was not the case, and Vermont joined Dartmouth on the medal stand ahead of us.

We got our revenge, however, the following week on our home waters in the Head of the Charles. We came in 13th in the always competitive cham-

pionship four event, 11 seconds behind a very experienced Yale boat that was second of the collegiate crews and only 4 seconds behind always tough Wisconsin and 29 seconds ahead of the same Dartmouth boat that had beaten us the week before!

Our lack of depth and experience, however, showed in the club eight

MIT/Cambridge Institute, we have less experience and depth than we have had in past years, and this showed in this race. Nonetheless, our hope is to make the most of the opportunity as our younger oarsmen gain experience.

We have just returned from our winter IAP training trip to Florida. This was, I believe, the best trip we have had since I have been at MIT. The squad made tremendous improvement, training more often in small boats, pairs and fours than in eights. The two weeks ended with a resumption of our 600m race with the University of Miami in Miami Beach after a one-year suspension.

The varsity heavyweight four beat Miami by open water. The frosh heavies beat our frosh lights by about half a length and Miami by slightly more in the frosh eight race, and our varsity heavies beat Miami by about a third of a length, understroking both Miami by a little and our winning

varsity lightweights by quite a bit in the varsity eights race. MIT lightweights took first and second in the second varsity/frosh eights race.

Mike Lane, our second-year frosh heavyweight coach, has done a tremendous job, blending some excited, experienced frosh in with a group of novices to form the base of what should be a fine freshman crew. He has brought a wonderful enthusiasm to the freshman squad and is proving to be a skillful and committed recruiter of good high school oarsmen.

We are very much looking forward to the spring season and building on into the future. The athletic department has demonstrated a level of support to our program and to institute athletics in general, which far exceeds anything I have seen since I have been here. The elevation of the women's squad to Division I was a courageous move by the department. We are very excited about the future!

MEN'S LIGHTWEIGHT CREW WRAP-UP

Full Of Promise, Full Of Hope, Determined As Ever

In just my second season as head coach of the lightweight men, the squad has continued to show increased speed and marked improvement. Perhaps the lightweights have adapted to early morning practices and rigorous training schedules. Using last season's performances as a launching pad, the lightweights hit the water this fall with renewed determination and high expectations.

The first varsity opened its season with its second straight win in the lightweight eight event at the Textile River Regatta. Under adverse conditions and amidst much confusion resulting from long delays and poor officiating, the 1V cruised to victory in 18:15, beating second-place Holy Cross by 11 seconds and third-place Boston College by 52 seconds. The second varsity rowed in the club eight event, finishing 24th (in a field of 32) with a time of 20:06.

The lightweights returned to the mighty Charles to begin seat racing and preparations for the Head of the Charles. This year, the freshman lightweights would participate in the fall classic in the youth eight event under new freshman coach Bill Patterson. After assisting Coach Hutton with the National Team Development Camp at Riverside Boat Club through the summer, Patterson, who had coached the novice women at MIT for three years, was asked to join the ranks of the lightweight men. Patterson's first order of business was to assemble a youth eight from the more than 40 freshmen trying out for the team. The freshmen rowed well despite many challenges and finished 36th out of 44 in the men's youth eight, with a time of 17:10.64.

The second varsity had a strong race in the men's club eight, chasing the boat from Rowing Club (which comprised current coaches and recent alums) the entire length of the course in what proved to be quite an exciting rivalry. The second varsity finished 50th with a time of 16:53.09, stealing the

show from the Rowing Club eight, who finished 58th with a time of 17:11.70. Hats off to the second varsity for showing those coaches how it's done!

In the coveted lightweight eight race, the first varsity took to the water with the hopes of racing well and improving its standing against its league rivals. The crew rowed a fast race in an amazingly fast field (the winning time just 9 seconds off of the course record), finishing 12th in a time of 15:37.81, a mere second ahead of Georgetown and

son with the Foot of the Charles, the varsity breaking down into fours and the freshmen remaining in the eights. Looking forward to meeting their league rivals once more, the varsity fours rowed solid races and finished quite strongly, especially among the lightweight crews in the race. The first varsity four finished third among the lightweight crews, behind the first fours from Harvard and Columbia. The second varsity four finished sixth among the lightweights, behind the second

fours from Harvard and Columbia. The third and fourth varsity fours finished 10th and 12th in the lightweight field.

In their first Foot of the Charles appearance, the freshman lightweights rowed very well, despite a minor collision between the first freshman eight and the first freshman heavyweight eight under the BU bridge. The freshmen finished sixth, seventh, and ninth among the lightweight crews, an encouraging finish to their first fall season.

Looking back, it was quite a season for the lightweights—full of promise, full of hope, and as determined as ever. The light-

weights will be looking to capitalize on the lessons they learned through the spring and fall seasons and to putting their fastest races on the line come spring 2002.

just 12 seconds behind Dartmouth.

On a cold New Hampshire morning, the frosh men put their best performances on the water, finishing seventh, eighth, and 10th in a field of 12. Since the format of the regatta allows heavyweight and lightweight crews to race side by side, the results were slightly more impressive considering that the freshmen finished third, fourth, and fifth among the lightweight crews.

WOMEN'S CREW WRAP-UP

Women Face Abbreviated Season For One Year Only

Thanks to all of the MIT alumni support we have received, the women's crew team will function under the DIII 21-week practice and racing season for 2001/2002 only. The DIII rules that we are following this year meant that we had to be off the water by October 28 and miss the Foot of the Charles. We also were not able to go to Florida over IAP this year and anxiously wait for February 11, 2002, when practices may resume as normal. Knowing that we had a shorter practice and racing season, we added more races earlier into our schedule.

Our first race was the Textile. Richard Branch and Sarah Lynch accompanied the women and coached them for me while I took two weeks off from practice after our daughter was born. The lightweight eight and the open fours, and open weights raced in the club eight and the pairs.

The lightweight women's eight race was strange. We placed second, 86 seconds behind Riverside, yet we were 75 seconds ahead of the next collegiate crew! The lightweights had fun breaking into stern and bow fours in the open four and placed sixth and 16th—a little seat racing done away from home. The open weights finished 14th out of 41, with Holy Cross

winning the race 66 seconds ahead. The opens did not get to show their pair speeds due to high winds.

We came home and worked on holding a faster base speed with the help of

our new NCAA rules would have us put away our boats for the season.

The open eight did not race as well as it had at the New Hampshire championships, placing 19 out of 54 entries in a very tight field. Still, even though the squad placed 19th, its time was within 4 percent of the winning time, guaranteeing an entry for next year. This was a big improvement from last year's 35th place and being 9 percent behind the winning time.

We also had the pleasure of having many of the class of 2000 with a few fill-ins from 2001 and 1999 returning to the boathouse and racing in the club eight and lightweight four. The alums finished 44th, beating 10 other crews. We hope they make this a tradition and that other class years will join them. The lightweight eight had a great race, doing a nice job with even pacing

over the home course. They finished eighth, the third collegiate crew behind Wisconsin and Radcliffe. Their time closed the gap to Riverside by 26 seconds.

Before we put away the boats, we spent some time in our new pairs. Once everyone learned how to toe and memorize the river, rowing in the pairs really helped smooth out differences in drive speeds. We hope that everyone will retain some of this over our long break from one another.

(\$157k endowment each). We will have more on this in future issues of *Squaring the Blade*.

Current MIT Crew Endowments:

There are currently eight endowment funds set up to benefit MIT crew: H.W. McCurdy (1922) Endowment for Crew, H.W. McCurdy (1922) Crew Coach, Charlie Butt (1941) Crew Shell, Class of 1921 Crew Shell, Allan Winter Rowe Memorial, Charles O. Jackson Memorial, Cornelius (1958) Peterson, and Frank G. Slaughter (1984). The market value of these eight

endowments as of July 1, 2001, was \$4.8 million. Based on this valuation, the targeted income that can be spent during FY02 is approximately \$156k. So, while these endowments are substantial, they generate income that constitutes only about 21 percent of the FY02 budgeted spending. The rest of the spending is covered by a combination of funds from MIT and the FOMITC Fund. Even with the FOMITC contributions to MIT crew, MIT has still historically paid for 60-70 percent of the MIT crew expenditures.

Future Plans: The FOMITC Managing

Committee is having regular discussions with MIT to reach agreement on future MIT crew spending and funding. Our thinking is to have a three-phase fundraising campaign, and we will report further on this in the future—perhaps as soon as the next issue of *Squaring the Blade*.

BYLAWS OF THE FRIENDS OF MIT CREW

As Adopted By The Interim Board Of Directors On March 12, 2002

ARTICLE I: NAME, AUTHORITY, And PURPOSE

3.01 Name of the Association

The name of the association shall be The Friends of MIT Crew, hereinafter sometimes referred to as "Friends" or "FOMITC," as established in 1985.

3.02 Purpose of FOMITC

The purpose is to enhance the success of the intercollegiate rowing program, to promote a rowing experience at MIT which enriches the education experience and encourages excellence, and to provide a vehicle for financial and inspirational support of rowing at MIT.

3.03 Effect

These bylaws are enacted pursuant to paragraph 12 of the Rules and Regulations of The Friends of MIT Crew, the agreement between the MIT administration and The Friends of MIT Crew, signed in June 2001 ("Agreement"). These bylaws are intended to supplement the Agreement in matters of organization and internal management of the Friends and shall supersede paragraph 3 of the Agreement. Additionally, the Board of Directors established in these bylaws shall assume responsibility for all those functions listed in the Agreement as duties or responsibilities of the Managing Committee. In the event of conflict between the Agreement and these bylaws, except in paragraph 3 of the Agreement, the Agreement shall control.

ARTICLE II: MEMBERS And ANNUAL MEETING

3.01 Qualifications

Membership in the Friends shall be open to anyone who supports rowing at MIT.

3.02 Annual Meeting

An annual meeting of the membership shall be held in the vicinity of Cambridge, MA, at a time and place to be decided by the Board of Directors. Written notice of the annual meeting shall be made to the membership at least thirty (30) days in advance with a draft agenda of business for the meeting. Directors shall be elected at the opening of the annual meeting by the Friends' members voting in person or by mailed or electronic ballot.

ARTICLE III: BOARD OF DIRECTORS

3.01 Powers and Compensation

The business and affairs of Friends shall be managed by its Board of Directors ("Board"). Directors shall serve without

compensation.

3.02 Number and Tenure of Directors

The number of elected, voting At-Large Directors, not including Special Directors and ex-officio Directors, shall be twelve (12), or more as set forth below. The term of the At-Large Directors shall be three (3) years. Each Director may hold office for two consecutive terms. An At-Large Director who serves two consecutive terms will not be eligible for re-election until three years after his or her most recent service.

3.03 Election of At-Large Directors

One-third (1/3) of the elected, voting At-Large Directors shall be elected for three-year terms at the annual meeting of Friends by the members voting in person, by mailed ballot (e-mail, postal mail, or Web site) or by written proxy based upon the ballot materials circulated in advance by or for the Nominating Committee. At-Large Directors shall be elected so that there are always three classes of approximately equal size, with the term of each class ending in consecutive years. To achieve the required consecutive year terms, the initial At-Large Directors shall be elected for initial terms of one, two, or three years, each of which shall be considered to be one term. Elected, voting At-Large Directors elected after the initial terms shall be elected for a term of three years. Any dispute as to the outcome or validity of this election, whether based on the low percentage of members voting or any other matter, shall be decided by the outgoing Board of Directors. An interim Board of Directors has been established as set forth in Exhibit 1 to serve from the date of adoption of these bylaws until the first annual meeting.

3.04 Special Directors

The Board of Directors may appoint additional, non-voting Special Directors whose terms shall be one year and who may be reappointed for one or more additional terms.

3.05 Ex-Officio Directors

The Board of Directors may appoint non-voting Ex-Officio Directors from the membership who have significantly supported MIT Crew, whose terms shall be one year, and who may be reappointed for one or more additional terms. The immediate past president of Friends, if not otherwise a Director, shall be an Ex-Officio Director for at least one subsequent year. The Commodore of the MIT Boat Club shall be an Ex-Officio Director.

3.06 Qualifications

Each of the twelve (12) At-Large Directors shall have had undergraduate rowing experience at MIT, be presented as a candidate by the Nominating Committee, and be elected by the membership. No current coach of any MIT crew or other personnel of the MIT Athletic Department may be a Director. However, the men's and women's varsity coaches and the Athletic Director, or their designated representatives, may be invited to attend meetings of the Board.

3.07 Annual Meeting

An annual meeting of the Board of Directors shall be held in the vicinity of MIT at the time of the annual membership meeting and shall be open to attendance by the membership. Notice of the annual Board meeting shall be made to the membership with a draft agenda of business for the meeting at least thirty (30) days in advance.

3.08 Election of Officers

The Board of Directors shall elect officers at the beginning of the annual meeting of the Board, immediately following the annual meeting of the Friends' membership, with their office terms to begin immediately.

3.09 Other Meetings

Meetings of the Board of Directors may be called by the President or at least four (4) At-Large Directors. Board meetings may be conducted in person or by electronic conference.

3.10 Notice

Notice of any meeting of the Board of Directors shall be given at least seven (7) days in advance in a manner (written notice, delivered personally, or sent by mail or e-mail to each Director at her/his address as shown by the records of the Friends, by fax, or by telephone) designed to reach all Directors. The notice shall specify the time, location, or means of participating, and business to be transacted.

3.11 Quorum

Sixty percent (60%) of the At-Large Directors shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at any meeting of the Board. If a quorum is not present, the Directors present may conduct business but any such business must be approved at a meeting of the Board of Directors within 30 days or ratified in writing within thirty (30) days by at least two-thirds (2/3) of the

Board.

3.12 Manner of Acting

The Board of Directors shall act by vote of a majority of those present with a quorum.

3.13 Procedure

The Board of Directors shall keep regular minutes of its proceedings. These minutes shall be mailed to Board members not more than thirty (30) days after the meeting, but at least seven (7) days prior to the next scheduled meeting.

3.14 Vacancies

Any vacancy, including Interim Directors as in 3.03, occurring on the Board of Directors shall be filled by the Board of Directors. A Director selected to fill a vacancy for an unexpired term of less than one year is eligible to serve two consecutive full terms on the Board.

3.15 Removal

The Board may remove any Director by a vote of seventy-five percent (75%) of all At-Large Directors. Absence from three (3) consecutive board meetings is equivalent to resignation from the Board, at the discretion of the Board. The Secretary shall give notice of removal in writing to the Director not more than ten (10) days subsequent to such action.

ARTICLE IV: OFFICERS

4.01 Election and Term of Office

The Board of Directors shall elect Officers at the beginning of the annual meeting of the Board, immediately following the annual meeting of the Friends membership. All officers shall be elected for one-year terms and may be re-elected for additional terms so long as they are At-Large Directors.

4.02 Vacancies

Any Officer may be removed from office by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the At-Large Directors. A vacancy in any office may be filled by the Board for the unexpired portion of the term.

4.03 President

The President shall serve as the Chief Executive Officer of the Friends. The President or other Officers as delegated by the President shall preside at meetings of the Officers and the Board of Directors. The President shall have such powers and/or perform such duties as are vested in the position by these bylaws, and as prescribed by the Board of Directors.

4.04 Vice Presidents

One or more Vice Presidents may be elected upon recommendation of the

Nominating Committee or appointed by the President, subject to ratification by the Board of Directors. Each Vice President shall have specific responsibilities established by the Board.

4.05 Secretary

The Secretary shall keep a record of attendance and the minutes of all Officer and Board of Directors meetings, keep a register of the post office and e-mail addresses and other contact information of each member and, in general, perform all duties incident to the office of Secretary. The Secretary may, with the prior approval of the Board of Directors, delegate some portion of these duties to staff employed at the Alumni Office or elsewhere, in which case the Secretary shall oversee such staff work and report on it to the Board. The Secretary shall perform such other duties as may be assigned by the President or prescribed by the Board of Directors.

4.06 Treasurer

The Treasurer will monitor and report balances, receipts and disbursements of all funds raised by Friends or used from any source to support rowing at MIT. The Treasurer shall perform such other duties as may be assigned by the President or prescribed by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE V: COMMITTEES

5.01 Nominating Committee

The Nominating Committee shall be a standing committee of three (3) members and shall prepare a slate of Directors and Officers for the annual meeting. The immediate past President shall be chair of the Nominating Committee. The other members of the committee shall be the next two preceding past Presidents. The Board shall appoint Nominating Committee members to fill vacant past President positions until there are three (3) past Presidents.

5.02 Selection Criteria

The Nominating Committee shall consider candidates, including those suggested for nomination by any member of the Friends, based upon their ability and potential to assist the Friends in accomplishing its purpose as stated in Section 1.02. The Nominating Committee shall also take into account diversity, including, but not limited to, age, gender, and undergraduate rowing experience, such that the membership of the Board is reasonably representative of the entire membership of Friends. The Nominating Committee shall each year announce to the entire membership the number of forthcoming Director vacancies and solicit suggestions for can-

didates from the membership. The ballot material, which the members receive for electing At-Large Directors, shall include all candidates who are deemed qualified. All references to the candidates shall be presented in the same format. Those recommended by the Nominating Committee may be so designated.

5.03 Other Committees

The Board of Directors may designate and appoint additional committees and shall set forth the charge of any such committee by resolution or other written instrument. Each committee shall consist of individuals selected by the President or the committee Chair as needed to carry out the charge to the committee. Each committee shall consist of at least one (1) Director but need not be chaired by a Director. The President shall recommend, subject to the approval of the Board, the chair of each committee and whether to designate such chair as a Vice President of the Board.

5.04 Rules and Functions

Each committee may adopt rules for its own government not inconsistent with these Bylaws or with rules adopted by the Board of Directors. Each committee shall formulate a statement of its function, which shall be submitted to the Board of Directors for approval.

5.05 Annual Review

The Secretary shall prepare, after consultation with the President, a report for the annual meeting of the Board of Directors on the committee structure, including existing and proposed committee functions, achievements, appointments, and other actions.

5.06 Term of Office

Each member of a committee shall continue as such until the next annual meeting, unless the committee shall be sooner terminated or unless such member shall cease to qualify as a member thereof.

5.07 Vacancies

Vacancies in the membership of any committee may be filled by appointments made in the same manner as provided in the case of original appointments.

5.08 Quorum

Unless otherwise provided, a majority of the whole committee including the committee Chair, shall constitute a quorum, and decisions made at meetings where a quorum is present shall be the act of the committee.

ARTICLE VI: OFFICE, RECORDS, AND STAFF

6.01 Fiscal Year

The fiscal year of Friends shall be the

same as MIT's fiscal year.

6.02 Books and Records

The Officers or their designees shall work with MIT, in accordance with Section 9 of the Agreement, to obtain financial and other information to prepare and present an annual report to the membership, and shall work with the Alumni Office to maintain a complete and accurate record of the names and contact information for all members.

6.03 Office

Unless otherwise designated by the

Board, the principal office of Friends shall be c/o The Association of Alumni & Alumnae of MIT ("Alumni Office"), 77 Massachusetts Avenue, Cambridge, Massachusetts 02139.

6.04 Support Staff

The President may, with approval of the Board of Directors and in accordance with the budget, retain and direct the work of staff to perform professional and/or clerical services related to the work of Friends. Any such services shall be hired under a contract approved by the Board of Directors or may be obtained

from Alumni Office staff according to agreement between Friends and the Alumni Office.

ARTICLE VII: AMENDMENT

7.01 Amendment

These bylaws may be altered, amended, or repealed and new Bylaws may be adopted by a vote of seventy-five percent (75%) of the Board of Directors and ratified by a majority of the members voting in person, by proxy, or by mailed or electronic ballot at the annual meeting of the membership. Written notice, describing completely any proposed change, shall be sent to the entire membership at least thirty (30) days prior to the Annual Meeting at which the vote is scheduled.
